

## **C** Internationals

Following the abolition in 1974 of the distinction between amateur and professional, there had been limited opportunity for players outside the Football League to earn international honours. In 1979, the England national football C team was formed as the England Non-League team.

It features players who play for clubs outside the Premier League and English Football League. Currently, the majority of selected players are full-time professionals with National League clubs.



Between 1974 and 1979 the team for the non-league had a number of names - the England National Game XI and the England Semi-Pro national team. I


It also played under the title of the Football Association XI. This name was kept for future representative games.


The national Under 23 football teams are now defunct. They operated under the auspices of their Football Association until 1976. The teams now operate as Under 21s.

## FUTSAL (2003 -

The national Futsal team represent their countries during international Futsal competitions such as the FIFA Futsal World Cup and the European Championships. It is under the direction of The Football Association. Although Futsal in England has been around for a number of years, the national team was first formed in 2003, after Futsal started to gain popularity in 2002.

## **MISCELLANEOUS**

Six ex-Northumberland pupils have been called into a Full England squad but have not played.



<u>John Milburn</u> was in the England squad which toured Czechoslovakia and Hungary in 1934 but he never appeared in either of the games.

<u>Derek Parkin</u> was included in the European Championships England squad in 1971 against Malta but only made the bench.

<u>Lee Clark</u> was the next one who was a member of England's 1997 squad for the Le Tournoi de France, but did not play.

Steven Taylor was called up to the England squad for the international against Germany in 2007 but he never got off the bench. The same happened again when he was called up for the San Marino World Cup fixture in 2013.

<u>Jack Colback</u> was in the England squad for the games against Norway and Switzerland in 2014 but he failed to get on the pitch.

<u>Callum Morris</u> In 2016, Morris was called up for the first time to the Northern Ireland squad for the World Cup qualifying game against the Czech Republic but failed to get on.

## FOOTBALL LEAGUE/PREMIER LEAGUE REFEREES

In this section you will find the names of former Northumberland and Newcastle pupils who went onto referee in the Football League, Premier League and Representative football.



John Watson (From Newcastle)

Whilst teaching at Benfield School he was a Football League and Premier League referee. He refereed 233 Football and Premier League games. He refereed two Schoolboy Internationals....England v Belgium at Wembley and England v Brazil at Roker Park. John was on the line on four other occasions for Schoolboy Internationals with two of them being at Wembley. His fourth Wembley appearance was to referee the FA

Trophy final in 1991 between Wycombe Wanderers and Kidderminster Harriers.

He, also, refereed the ESFA Under 15 Trophy Final second leg between Sunderland Boys and Middlesbrough at Roker Park.



Alan Wilkie (From Newcastle)
Football League Premier League

Football League, Premier League and UEFA referee. He refereed the 2000 League Cup Final between Tranmere Rivers and Leicester City. He was, also, in the middle for the infamous 'Kung fu' kick by Eric Cantona in the match between Crystal Palace and Manchester United.



Tommy Thompson ( From Lemington )

Football League and FIFA referee. He officiated the FA Cup final in 1939 at Wembley. The finalists were Portsmouth and Wolverhampton Wanderers. He became the youngest ever FA Cup final referee (aged 37yrs) at the time. He refereed 6 internationals.



Bob Matthewson (From Byker)

Football League, Premier League and FIFA referee. He refereed the 1977 FA Cup Final between Manchester United and Liverpool and the infamous 1974 Charity Shield game between Liverpool and Leeds United. He was in the middle for two internationals.



## Michael Oliver (From Ashington)

At only 25 years of age, Michael Oliver became the youngest referee in Premier League history when he took charge of Birmingham City's clash with Blackburn Rovers in August 2010. He now belongs to the Select Group of Referees in England and officiates primarily in the Premier League. He received his FIFA badge in 2012, allowing him to officiate in major international matches. Oliver was appointed to take charge of the final of the 2015 FIFA U-17 World Cup. Oliver was promoted to the UEFA Elite Group of Referees in 2018.

He refereed the 2014 FA Community Shield game between Arsenal and Manchester City. Two years later he refereed the Football League Cup Final between Liverpool and Manchester City. In 20018 he was in the middle for the Chelsea and Manchester United FA Cup Final. He also refereed the 2021 FA Cup Final between Chelsea and Leicester City.
